

It's not always easy to help someone, especially when the person is in a perilous situation. But this has been the testimony of Rebecca*, an Open Doors worker helping North Korean women who escaped from their country for survival. She loves these women so much that she risks *everything* just to be able to serve them, and most importantly, show them how much Jesus loves them.

This year, in its 30th edition, North Korea is back at the #1 spot in the annual World Watch List - Open Doors' list of 50 countries where Christians are most persecuted.

Globally, millions of Jesus' followers face extreme persecution, but it doesn't change the fact that they are extremely loved by our heavenly Father. This is the love that overflows from Rebecca for the women she meets. This is the love Open Doors seeks to continue to show the persecuted church. And this is the love that you exemplify each time you remember them in your prayers and support.

EXTREME LOVE

As persecution of Christians around the world intensifies, Open Doors workers are risking everything to stand with them. But it can only happen with your support...

Rebecca* speeds along a darkened track in illegal transportation, deep in the countryside. She's keeping a look-out for the police, who would ask questions and demand to see her ID. The journey has taken hours; she's come a different route from previous trips.

This brave woman is on her way to a secret location to visit her 'sisters', as she calls them, a group of North Korean women who've fled or been trafficked into this country.

The trip is fraught with danger. But for Rebecca, it's worth it – *because the women she's going to meet are risking everything to follow Jesus.*

“Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.”

“Others like me have been caught and imprisoned,” says Rebecca. “But it’s a risk I’m willing to take to share the gospel. After all, the women I’m going to see take a far worse risk in coming to hear it.”

Rebecca is one of Open Doors extraordinary workers ministering to Christians who are at risk of the most extreme persecution. If the North Korean

women are caught meeting Rebecca, they could be deported back to North Korea and sent to a prison camp. If they are discovered with a Bible, their whole families could be jailed. There's even a risk the women could be executed.

Dangerous places

North Korea is among the top 10 most dangerous places in the world to be a Christian. Globally, persecution is becoming more extreme and increasingly violent. In countries like Afghanistan, Iran, Somalia and Eritrea, followers of Jesus can be imprisoned, brutally tortured or even killed if their faith is discovered.

Today, more Christians are murdered for their faith than at any time in the last 30 years.

It's a shockingly high price to pay – but for believers like the North Korean refugee women, it's a risk they will take.

'Overflowing with hope'

"The ladies have a really miserable life," says Sister J*, who works alongside Rebecca. Many women have been sold by traffickers to men they have never met before, to become wives or bear children. They have no legal status or freedom here.

"I would make the journey every time. Even for one."

"But even though they are suffering and hiding, the women are full of joy in Christ," said Sister J. "They do not complain about their circumstances but give thanks for everything. They

are overflowing with joy and hope. That is only possible because God really walks with them."

And as faith grows among the refugee women, so the North Korean church will be strengthened. Sister R*, another Open Doors field worker, told us, "These women symbolise the women of North Korea. We cannot go inside the country, but these women will eventually form a church in North Korea."

Stand with them

For more than 25 years, Open Doors has been providing practical and spiritual support to North Korean believers. But today, your support and prayers are needed more than ever.

As Sister J says, "We are a team..."

we go out to share the gospel, but you send us there. God gives you a heart to support us. Without your support and prayers, we cannot do anything.” It’s up to us to stand with Open Doors workers risking everything to help our persecuted brothers and sisters.

For Rebecca, arriving in the darkness at her secret meeting place, there’s the usual jolt of fear. Is she too late? Have the women been found out? Every moment of this furtive gathering is risky. But extreme persecution demands extreme love – and Rebecca would choose nothing else.

“These women will eventually form a church in North Korea.”

“God compels our love and our call to serve each other, despite the danger. Being with the women is my greatest joy,” she says. “I would make the journey every time. Even for one.”

ABOUT THE LIST

The World Watch List is compiled by Open Doors' analysts using real-world data from experts on the ground in 150 countries. Persecution in each country is recorded using a points system which tracks violence and pressure. This measures the number and severity of violent incidents against Christians and the degree of pressure exerted against the practice of their faith in 5 spheres of life.


PERSECUTION

HIGH
41-60 points

For the third year, very high or extreme intensity of persecution.




Maximum score for each is 16.7, maximum total of 100 when combined. Each country's ranking is determined by its total score out of 100, giving an indication of severity of persecution.



PERSECUTION LEVELS

● **VERY HIGH** (61-80 points)
 ● **EXTREME** (81-100 points)

Year after year, every country on the list is ranked as having extreme levels of persecution, showing the continued persecution against Christians.

NORTH KOREA

“The thing I give thanks for the most is that Father God uses me to work as His servant. I desire to dedicate my life, until death, to glorify Him.”

Bae and her husband were sent to a remote village because they follow Jesus. But here, the secret church they are leading is flourishing.

NALA*
SOMALIA

“Jesus has changed me. I realize that I didn’t choose Him, but He chose me. I didn’t go out looking for Him, but He found me. Previously I didn’t have happiness, but now I have joy.”

Nala, a Somali woman in her 20s, came to faith in Christ, it was the end of life as she knew it. Leaving Islam meant she lost her country, her home and her family. It may even cost her life.



MOHAMMAD*
YEMEN

“I couldn’t read the Bible at home; that would not be safe. I had to hide the book and read it outside the house. I thought I was the only believer in Yemen. For a long time, I didn’t know any other Christians. Now I know many, and there are many more like us.”

Mohammad found a Bible in a second-hand shop, became a follower of Jesus.



SHIDEN*
ERITREA

“I will serve the Lord until I die; I want to serve the Lord for the rest of my days; I want to be a hero of the faith, too, and one day in the future claim the crown of righteousness that is laid up for me, which the Lord will award to me on that day.”

Shiden was imprisoned for more than a decade—simply for worshipping Jesus.



PASTOR ANDREW
NIGERIA

“We are pleading for your prayers, especially for myself and my family... And we will fix our minds on the work ahead of us, and work towards spreading the gospel.”

After a devastating attack by Boko Haram, Pastor Andrew and his Christian community picked up the pieces and rebuilt to remain a light in Nigeria through the help of your prayer and support.



YOUR IMPACT

Holding on to Jesus

Since the Taliban seized control of Afghanistan, almost 18 months ago, life for Christians has become perilous. But believers hold on to Jesus – and your support and prayers bring hope.

“The Christian is a ‘kafir’ – sinner or infidel. If a man is found to be a Christian, they would kill him immediately. And not only him, *but his whole family...*”

Nilofer*, a refugee, is explaining the horrific cost of following Jesus in her homeland, Afghanistan. She’s one of many believers who fled when the Taliban swept into Kabul and seized power in August 2021. “If I was in Afghanistan now, I would not be alive today, for sure,” added Nilofer.

“God has been faithful to Afghan Christians.”

Last year, Afghanistan topped Open Doors World Watch List as the most dangerous place in the world to be a Christian. Today, the Afghan church is depleted and hidden, suffering intense persecution.

Taliban soldiers roamed villages, going door-to-door in search of believers and unleashing violent attacks. Girls no longer attend school, and women who refuse to wear the hijab are beaten, even killed.

But you stood with our Afghan brothers and sisters when it mattered most.

Your prayers give strength and courage to the Christians who remain. Open Doors partner Hana* said, “Afghan believers carry the responsibility to be the light of Christ in a very dark world, and many die for their faith.”

“You came to help us, you have not let us disappear into the darkness.”

She added, “Christians in this country stay to be the light of Christ and so God will bless their homeland even if their fellow

citizens are hostile to them. Though there are only a handful of believers, God has been faithful to them. He answers their prayers, gives them strength to endure suffering, and He leads the global church, like you, to pray.”

Your gifts also provide vital practical help to Christian refugees. Open Doors partner Miranda* visited families sheltering in an apartment together, in a secret location. “All of them sold everything they owned to come here,” said Miranda. “But life is difficult. They are professional doctors and nurses but they cannot work, and must pay to renew their refugee status every year.”

“You came to help us, you have not let us disappear into the darkness,” said one believer. Your gifts supply food and essentials to families in need – and, above all, your support means Afghan Christians know they are not alone.


