

THE HEIGHTENING RISKS OF FOLLOWING JESUS WORLDWIDE

More than 360 million Christians worldwide suffer high levels of persecution and discrimination for their faith – that’s a staggering 1 in 7 believers.

This is according to the Open Doors World Watch List, an annual ranking of the countries where Christians face the most persecution. This year marks its 30th iteration and during this time hostility against our brothers and sisters worldwide has intensified.

In 1993, Christians faced high to extreme levels of persecution in 40 countries. This number has nearly doubled to 76 countries in 2023. In the top 50 alone, 312 million Christians now face very high or extreme levels.

These sobering statistics must provoke a response from us. “If one part suffers, every part suffers with it,” the apostle Paul says in 1 Corinthians 12:26. Your prayers and support will help enable our brothers and sisters to keep following Jesus, no matter the risks.

JIHADISTS SEEK TO MAKE AFRICA FIRST ISLAMIC CONTINENT

Several trends have emerged from the latest World Watch List, including violence against Christians in sub-Saharan Africa hitting new heights as jihadists seek to make Africa the first Islamic continent. This is already having catastrophic consequences for the church – and the risks may yet worsen.

Just as poorer nations were beginning to recover from the pandemic, Russia's invasion of Ukraine raised food, fertiliser and energy prices. This – alongside political instability, weak governance and climate change – has made the region fertile ground for the activities of jihadist groups as well as criminal gangs and mercenary soldiers, with believers among those severely affected and often targeted. Tens of thousands have been forced from their homes, putting them at further risk of attack.

Across the 26 nations that recorded at least high levels of persecution against Christians, the number of violent attacks experienced by believers rose by five per cent. In half of these countries, including Nigeria, Burkina Faso, Central African Republic, Niger and Mozambique, the levels of violence hit extremely high levels.

Persecution of Christians in Nigeria – Africa's most populous nation – has reached unprecedented levels, with violence spreading to the

Christian-majority south. Boko Haram and Fulani militants, together with armed bandits, are causing untold devastation to Christian communities.

In places that implement Sharia (Islamic law), like Somalia, Comoros and parts of Nigeria, violence goes hand in hand with serious pressure in other areas of life, including work, school and the family.

CHINA LOOKS TO REDEFINE HUMAN RIGHTS

China redefines human rights not in terms of dignity and worth, as it's been classically understood, but as the "right" to development and happiness.

It may seem a subtle shift, but it represents a greater control over people – by claiming that what the people really want is 'stability' and 'security'. It's highly concerning for Christians, whose values and beliefs undermine the intentions of the state, to the extent that believers risk being branded as 'troublemakers' and 'disturbers of the peace'.

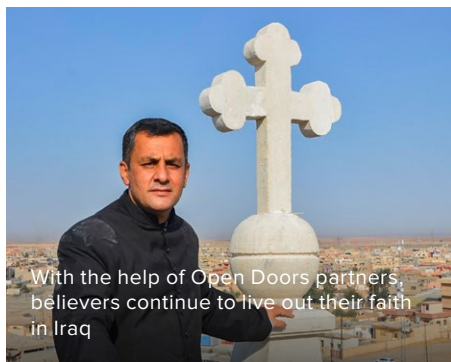
In March 2022, draconian laws were introduced that require a permit to share religious material on the internet.

Some observers believe that the ruling Communist Party is looking to rewrite the terms of its contract with society, focusing less on economic advancement and more on the promise of security and wellbeing – or, in other words, a society rooted in the new human rights.

CLINGING TO HOPE IN THE MIDDLE EAST

In many ways, the redefinition of human rights is already emerging in the Middle East, with many believers, especially converts from Islam, deemed troublemakers and labelled a threat to national security. A case in point is Iran, where house churches are regularly raided and Christians sent to prison.

It's not the only risk facing Christians in the region. In places like Iraq and Syria, the number of believers has dropped significantly, in large part due to the continued impact of so-called Islamic State's emergence nearly a decade ago. Unemployment among young Christians is high, while children are vulnerable to bullying from peers and teachers at school. Syria is rarely in the news today but conflict persists – last year, dozens of churches and Christian buildings were damaged in attacks by Turkish armed forces and at least five Christians kidnapped.

The challenges reinforce the importance of our *Hope for the Middle East* campaign, which through

your support have established 160 Centres of Hope in Iraq and Syria. These are enabling many believers to remain in the region and have hope for the future.

INCREASING OPPOSITION IN LATIN AMERICA

The region that has seen the sharpest increase in persecution is Latin America, with four countries rising substantially in this year's list. Mexico has risen five places to 38, Colombia has gone from 30 to 22, Cuba has risen ten spots to 27, while Nicaragua jumps from 61 to 50, putting it in the top 50 for the first time.

Corrupt and ineffective governments, particularly in the rural areas of Mexico and Colombia, have created space for criminal groups and ethnic leaders to grow in influence and become drivers of persecution.

In Cuba and Nicaragua, repressive governments are intensifying efforts to suppress those they deem opponents to their rule. In Nicaragua especially, the silencing of Christians has become increasingly apparent, with churches that speak out against injustice and human rights violations by the government viewed as destabilising agents.

WHAT'S THE GOOD NEWS?

There have been moves towards greater tolerance of religious freedom in several Gulf states, including Bahrain and United Arab Emirates. This is within a moderate Islamic framework that seeks to counter

extremism and make their countries more hospitable for Christians. In such places – as well as in Egypt, where there is an increased focus on ‘national unity’ – hate speech against believers from historical and expatriate communities is often not tolerated, although radical elements still exist within their societies.

Elsewhere in the Gulf, Qatar has seen a reduction in opposition towards Christians. This is largely due to no churches being closed in 2022, which may be linked to the FIFA World Cup and the spotlight it put on the country’s human rights record. That said, a significant number of churches closed during the pandemic have not been allowed to reopen.

BLESSED ARE THE TROUBLEMAKERS

In Acts 17, believers in Thessalonica were dragged before the authorities by furious locals who claimed, “These men who have caused trouble all over the world have now come here...” (17:6) In the eyes of many, the early believers were ‘troublemakers’ and ‘disturbers of the peace’ – the very accusations increasingly facing many Christians today.

The early church took huge risks to carry the gospel to the places where they were scattered. Their extraordinary legacy lives on to this day – not only in the way they began spreading the gospel to all nations, but in their example of courageous faith that our persecuted family are seeking to follow today, regardless of the risks involved.

30 YEARS OF THE WORLD WATCH LIST

What inspired the first Open Doors World Watch List in 1993?

The fall of the Soviet Union in 1989, which reduced the need for Bible smuggling in the region, released funds and resources for use elsewhere. In 1991, a team were tasked with researching the countries where Open Doors was active and where the work could expand to. Two years later, the first list was produced.

How did the list change in the 1990s?

Initially, the list was not made public; it was primarily used by Open Doors to direct their work. But towards the end of the decade it was made public, to provide people with an overall picture of persecution to inspire support and prayers.

How has the list changed our understanding of persecution?

It’s revealed the complexity of persecution. This includes how multiple factors can drive hostility, how persecution affects believers in different ways, and how persecution can be subtle as well as violent.

What are some of the key trends over the past 30 years?

Persecution has grown and intensified in Africa, mainly due to the rise of jihadism. The latest list bears this out, with violence against Christians hitting new heights. Opposition has also intensified in many Asian countries owing to a rise in authoritarianism and Islamic expression.



1 NORTH KOREA

ENCOUNTERING JESUS AFTER ESCAPING NORTH KOREA

“We have to take risks,” says Sister J. She and Sister R are Open Doors fieldworkers serving women who have escaped North Korea – the most dangerous country in the world in which to be a Christian. “But even though it is risky and we know it is not safe, we still have to do it.”

Nothing about this work, or the journeys women make from North Korea, is safe. But were it not for the courage of workers like Sister J, women scarred by the brutal dictatorship of the North Korean regime, and the trafficking they are caught in whilst making their escape, wouldn't find the care they yearn for. And they wouldn't encounter Jesus.

DAANGEROUS JOURNEYS

North Korea is experiencing severe famine in the wake of the pandemic, leading to many people fleeing the country in search of jobs to support their families back home.

However, approval for travel is only given to government officials and the upper class, meaning people must flee illegally – and this is very dangerous. Those who avoid being caught or drowning in a freezing river as they attempt to cross borders often end up being sold as wives or mothers if lured by a broker under false promises.

These are the women Open Doors fieldworkers are reaching by running Bible studies and giving practical support. Helping them, and even gaining their trust, takes time. “But as the years go by, the sisters come just to hear the talks from the fieldworkers and to share the Bible verses,” says Sister R. “Through this they encounter Jesus Christ.” Some get baptised, whilst others go on to help the ministry.

The risks these ladies take in choosing to follow Jesus cannot be exaggerated. They are already deemed an enemy of the

North Korean state by escaping – becoming a Christian only entrenches this. Meanwhile, the Bible studies are vulnerable to raids by the authorities. “They are taking risks all the time,” says Sister J. “Any time they could get captured, deported back to North Korea and imprisoned.”

“THEY EXPERIENCED SOMETHING VERY UNUSUAL AND VERY HEAVENLY BECAUSE OF YOUR PRAYERS”

The ladies embrace these grave risks because of their love for Jesus. “They never lose their hope. They are so excited to know Jesus Christ, even though they are still suffering and still hiding,” Sister J continues.

HEAVENLY EXPERIENCES

The extraordinary faith and courage of these North Korean women, and those serving them, would not be possible without the prayers and support of Christians worldwide.

“There are times when they are travelling when they are caught by the guards and their ID is checked,” says Sister R of some of the fieldworkers’ experiences. “Those are very dangerous times because the ministry’s location could be revealed. But then the guards check

the people in front of them and they just pass over the fieldworker and check the people behind them. And they think, ‘What’s happening? Why don’t they check us?’ And then they say ‘Oh, it’s surely a miracle!’”

“There were many testimonies from the fieldworkers that they experienced something very unusual and something very heavenly because of your prayers,” she continues. “There are times when they are discouraged because things seem so closed down and seem not to be working. But during their prayers they feel, ‘Surely the brothers and sisters of the world are praying for me, because I have this sudden light or courage.’”

But the impact of your prayers doesn’t end there, because the sisters are working towards a bigger vision – making the risks even more worth taking. “It’s also about strengthening the church inside North Korea,” says Sister R. “We cannot go inside the country, but these women will eventually form a church in North Korea.”

These stories reinforce how much your prayers and support are needed to help the persecuted church stand strong in their faith and share it with others, not just in North Korea but across the world.

WHO ARE OPEN DOORS?

Over 360 million Christians around the world face persecution and discrimination for their faith.

Where Christians face persecution, we support the church by smuggling Bibles and Christian literature, offering legal advice, training church leaders and other Christians, and providing vital practical support such as trauma care and emergency aid.

Where Christians are free, we help the church to pray, give and speak up for their persecuted brothers and sisters.

So, it's not 'us and them'. It is all of us together, one family of believers, working in partnership to bring the light and love of Christ into some of the darkest places on earth.

WHAT IS THE WORLD WATCH LIST?

The Open Doors World Watch List is a unique, reliable, comprehensive ranking of the countries where the persecution of Christians is most extreme.

UNIQUE...

because, as far as possible, our data is gathered at grass-roots level, collected from in-country networks and local partners on the ground.

RELIABLE...

because over three decades, the list has gained a reputation for credible, dependable information. Our approach and analysis is independently audited by the International Institute for Religious Freedom.

COMPREHENSIVE...

because it measures persecution in all its forms: not only violence, but also the freedom Christians have to practise their faith in their private, family, community, national and church life.

This data is converted into a points system, which is then ranked into categories:

-  **HIGH** 41-60 POINTS
-  **VERY HIGH** 61-80 POINTS
-  **EXTREME** 81-100 POINTS

WHAT DO YOU MEAN BY 'PERSECUTION'?

Persecution takes many forms, from insults and abuse, to discrimination in education and the workplace, to outright violence. We might characterise these different forms as 'smash' and 'squeeze'.

The 'smash' represents overt violence against Christians because of their faith: bombing, shooting, rapes, kidnappings, forcible evictions.

The 'squeeze' represents the suffocating restrictions faced by many Christians in daily life: red tape and legal restrictions, an inability to publicly display their faith, discrimination woven into the fabric of society.

'Smash' is physical, visible, violent. 'Squeeze' is insidious, structural, suffocating.

But both have the same aim: the erasure of Christianity in their country, region, tribe or family.

POPULATION

LEADER

Kim Jong-un

PERSECUTION SCORE +2

North Korea remains a brutally hostile place for Christians.

If discovered, they are either sent to atrocious labour camps or executed – and their families will share a similar fate. Christians have no freedom and it's almost impossible for believers to gather.

The reason for such extreme persecution is that Christianity is seen as a particular threat to the dictatorial ideology and governance of the country's regime. Christians are viewed as enemies of both the leadership and society.

Open Doors secret workers are keeping 80,000 North Korean believers alive with vital food and aid through secret networks in other country, as well as providing shelter and discipleship training for North Korean refugees at safe houses.

PLEASE PRAY

- That the Holy Spirit will pour supernatural peace and strength into believers held in labour camps
- That Christians who bravely gather in secret will not be discovered
- That authorities will allow the country to be helped by the wider world.

SOMALIA

LEADER

Prime Minister Hamza Abdi Barre

PERSECUTION SCORE +1

The violent insurgent group al-Shabaab has repeatedly expressed its desire to eradicate Christians from the country, and have intensified their hunt for Christians.

Christians from Muslim backgrounds are particularly regarded as high-value targets and may be killed on the spot if discovered. Christians also face serious persecution from their family and community, as Somali society expects all Somalis to be Muslim. Any deviation from this is very dangerous.

Open Doors supports Somali believers across the Horn of Africa through discipleship training and equipping them to cope with severe persecution.

PLEASE PRAY

- For peace and for God's protection against rising extremism over His church
- That isolated Somali believers will know God's comfort and find ways to grow in their faith
- For God's wisdom and protection over Open Doors' work in the Horn of Africa and that it will bear much fruit.

2 SOMALIA

NALA'S STORY

Nala* knew that exploring Christianity through social media was dangerous – but she couldn't help it. "I started to look for more videos and found others who shared the Word of God," says Nala. "I connected with them through Facebook and asked them to tell me about Christ."

After a while, she made the life-changing choice to follow Jesus! She met with other secret believers and was eventually baptized.

But she had to keep her faith secret from her Muslim family – they would be furious if they found out. They might even kill her.

Unfortunately, Nala's family became suspicious and discovered that she was a Christian. They locked her up in a room in their home and pledged her in marriage to a sheikh who already had two wives. But a few days before the wedding, Nala ran away. She hid with Christian friends, who helped her to

escape the country and find spiritual and discipleship support.

"Jesus had changed me," Nala says, confident in her decision to become a Christian. "I realised that I didn't choose Him, but He chose me. I didn't go out looking for Him, but He found me. Now I have joy. I know that until I came to know Jesus, I knew nothing at all."

PERSECUTION SCORE +1

Yemen is strongly tribal and it's illegal to convert from Islam to Christianity. Yemeni Christian converts are at great risk of being ostracised, expelled, or even killed by their families, clans and tribes.

Islamic extremist groups threaten so-called 'apostates' with death if they do not return to Islam. In other areas, including those controlled by the Islamist Houthis, converts risk imprisonment. In detention centres, Christian detainees have reportedly suffered physical and mental torture.

Open Doors supports the body of Christ in Yemen by distributing relief aid and Christian literature, and offering shelter, protection and livelihood training to persecuted believers and their relatives.

PLEASE PRAY

- For secret believers who choose to follow Christ, despite the dangers
- For humanitarian aid to reach all people in need, including those on the margins of society
- That God would change the atmosphere of scrutiny and mistrust so that all Yemenis can live safely.

PERSECUTION SCORE +1

Believers in Eritrea who gather outside the three officially recognised and closely monitored denominations do so at risk of extreme persecution.

An estimated 1,000 Christians are indefinitely detained in Eritrean prisons, not officially charged with any crime. Some leaders of 'unofficial' churches have been imprisoned for more than a decade.

Despite this hostility from the authorities – as well as the pressures converts experience from families and communities – the church in Eritrea is seeing remarkable growth.

Open Doors works through local church partners in Eritrea to provide economic empowerment projects, discipleship and persecution survival training.

PLEASE PRAY

- That those in power in Eritrea have a change of heart towards Christians
- For supernatural strength, hope and joy for imprisoned believers and their families
- For Open Doors' work to strengthen new believers coming to faith in such a challenging context.

Interim Prime Minister Abdul Hamid Dbeibeh

PERSECUTION SCORE -3

Libya is effectively a lawless land where native and migrant Christians face extreme danger. With no effective government, Islamic extremists and organised crime groups both wield power. They target, kidnap, and even kill Christians.

If a Libyan from a Muslim background becomes a Christian, they are likely to face intense pressure and abuse from their community, or worse. It is supposedly legal to convert, but this law is ambiguous and often abused or ignored.

Open Doors works with local partners and churches in North Africa to provide leadership training, discipleship, livelihood support, pastoral care and prayer support.

PLEASE PRAY

- For nationwide stability, law and order to come quickly to Libya
- That God would break the power of the organised criminal gangs exploiting vulnerable people
- For Christians to be able to safely communicate and encourage one another.

NIGERIA

**POPULATION**

LEADER

President Muhammadu Buhari

PERSECUTION SCORE +1

Attacks by Islamic militant groups have increased consistently since 2015, but the government has failed to prevent the rise in violence, which affects all Nigerians but particularly Christians.

The violence is most pervasive in the north, where militant groups inflict murder, physical injury, abduction and sexual violence on their victims. Christians are dispossessed of their land and their means of livelihood. Many live as internally displaced people or refugees.

Open Doors works through local church partners to strengthen Christians in Nigeria with discipleship and persecution survival training, trauma care, relief aid and economic empowerment projects.

PLEASE PRAY

- Thank God for the courageous faith of believers in Nigeria, who refuse to deny Christ despite the dangers
- For an end to the violence inflicted by militant groups across Nigeria
- That Open Doors partners can reach more survivors of violence and abduction with trauma care and persecution survival training.

PASTOR MARCOS' STORY

6 NIGERIA

Pastor Marcos was leading a church in Adamawa State, northern Nigeria, when Boko Haram attacked. Villages were ransacked, churches burned, and men and women murdered. When the violence subsided, Marcos found that people were reluctant to return to church.

“When you walk with the Lord and these things happen to you, there is disappointment, fear and loss of trust and hope,” he says. “My own spiritual life was greatly shaken because I was so afraid. But still the Word of God kept reminding me that, for anyone who puts their trust in God, He won’t forsake them.”



After the attacks, many believers no longer believed they could depend on God to help them. But Pastor Marcos persevered in inviting people one-by-one to renew their trust in God.

“This persecution has become like a fertiliser for the gospel,” he testifies. “Our church had only 200 members before Boko Haram came, but now

we have 300 to 400 members.

“We do not pray that God will take away the hardship, but that God should give us the grace to be able to stand. Since our Master, Jesus, went through this suffering, we also who have become His followers will go through it. But in the end, we will be victorious.”

PERSECUTION SCORE -1

Christians in Pakistan are considered second-class citizens and face discrimination in every aspect of life.

Although there were no major attacks against churches last year, there are almost constant attacks against individuals. There are growing numbers of Christian (and other minority religion) girls being abducted, abused and forcibly converted to Islam. The number of cases of blasphemy, which can be punishable by death, continues to rise.

Open Doors is active in the Persian Gulf countries through a network of partner churches, but for security reasons, we cannot say what we do where.

PLEASE PRAY

- That Pakistan's blasphemy laws will be changed so that Christians will be safe from false accusations
- For protection for women who suffer domestic violence and girls who are forced into marriage

The state is increasing its surveillance and control over people's lives, as last year's protests by Iranian women have highlighted. Muslim background believers must meet in secret, with the risk of being caught and prosecuted for 'crimes against national security'.

This year has seen an increase in reported violence against Christians. Many choose to emigrate.

Open Doors partners support the church in Iran with online ministry presence, Christian multimedia initiatives and advocacy.

PLEASE PRAY

- That Jesus will set many more hearts free in Iran
- That imprisoned believers will know God's loving presence
- For strong faith and courage for the Iranian Christians meeting in secret.

Despite dropping from first place to ninth, Afghan Christians remain in grave danger. Many have fled or been forced further underground, making them less visible for attack.

In the past year, the Taliban have focused on consolidating power, not targeting non-Muslims, resulting in fewer violent incidents against Christians that are clearly linked to their faith. However, since leaving Islam is considered shameful and punishable by death under Islamic law, converts risk devastating consequences at the hands of the authorities or even their own family, tribe or clan if discovered.

Open Doors raises prayer for persecuted believers in Afghanistan, and provides practical support to Afghan Christians forced to flee to neighbouring countries.

PLEASE PRAY

- For God's protection and presence to surround secret believers
- That those who have fled the country will have all their needs met
- That the Holy Spirit will soften the hearts of the Taliban leaders towards women and religious minorities.

Once a 'good news story', instability in Sudan has led to persecution intensifying.

Christian converts from Islam are still vulnerable to extreme persecution from both their communities and their own families. Since the military coup in 2022, four churches have been forced to close, and trying to build new churches is still extremely difficult. Although the death penalty for leaving Islam has now been abolished, there are fears that this punishment could be reinstated.

Open Doors works through local church partners in Sudan to strengthen persecuted Christians through persecution survival training, discipleship training and economic empowerment projects.

PLEASE PRAY

- For peace to prevail in Sudan and that God will establish rulers who enforce respect for human rights
- For church leaders engaging with their Muslim counterparts to have constructive dialogue
- That believers from Muslim backgrounds will grow in their knowledge of Christ.

Only Hindus are truly Indians. That's the false ideology on the rise in many parts of India.

Christians increasingly experience social exclusion, discrimination at work and false rumours which can lead to vigilante violence. Most at risk are new believers from Hinduism – they can face brutal assaults or even murder.

Hindu extremists target church leaders, their wives and children with violence to sow fear in the Christian community. In some states, they seem to face no legal consequences.

Open Doors partners strengthen the church in India by providing Bibles, emergency aid, persecution survival training, and livelihood and community development projects.

PLEASE PRAY

- For a change of narrative around Indian identity to one that accepts minority faiths
- For protection over church leaders and their families
- That converts' genuine faith would have a powerful effect on their families and neighbours.

Years of conflict and instability have created an environment in which persecution can flourish with impunity.

In the few areas controlled by Islamic militants, leaders of traditional churches are particularly targeted for kidnap or attack, and most church buildings have either been demolished or repurposed as Islamic centres. Even in government-controlled areas, evangelism is seen as a threat to social stability and is therefore heavily suppressed.

Open Doors partners strengthen the church in Syria through Bible distribution, discipleship and leadership training, trauma counselling, relief aid and practical support for internally displaced people, and Centres of Hope, which support Syrian Christians and their communities.

PLEASE PRAY

- That Christians will stand firm in their faith and continue to be salt and light in their communities
- For ongoing provision for Centres of Hope restoring and caring for war-weary people
- For peace and stability in the country.

JOUAN'S STORY

12 SYRIA



Like many young Syrians, Juan's normal life was uprooted by the civil war. Originally from a Muslim background, he secretly fled with his family to Lebanon. When he was about 15, a local pastor took him to church and gave him a Bible.

Juan eventually became a Christian – but practising his faith was difficult. “None of my family were believers; they didn't accept it. I didn't go to the church; I was not allowed to go. So I spent these four years alone... It was difficult, but God was with me all the time. He was giving me the power to continue.”

Eventually, Juan's mother came to faith after experiencing healing. And he is praying for his father to come to believe too. Juan knows that God has a future for him and his family.

“We have nothing, but we have God. He can give us everything. He can do miracles and He can change lives and He can show you that He is next to you. Even in the middle of problems, in the middle of persecution, like I'm living in, He can change lives – you just have to ask Him.”

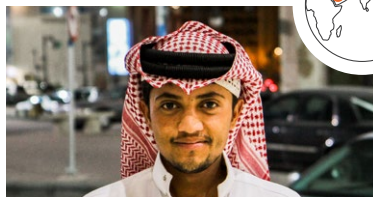

Saudi Arabia is a highly conservative Islamic nation. No official churches are allowed, and it remains one of the few countries in the world where church buildings are forbidden.

Foreign Christians are severely restricted in sharing their faith and gathering for public worship. Conversion from Islam to Christianity is forbidden under Islamic law, so the small number of Saudi converts live as secret believers. But despite the risks, their numbers are slowly increasing.

Open Doors supports the body of Christ on the Arabian Peninsula by organising prayer, distributing Scripture resources, and training believers and pastors.

- That secret believers who are isolated will find ways to connect with other believers online
- For an end to the oppressive treatment of women in Saudi Arabia
- That God will continue to build His church through the witness of courageous believers.

New believers face opposition from Buddhist, Muslim or tribes. Communities aiming to stay 'Buddhist only' sometimes even deny Christians water.

Working through local partners, Open Doors strengthens persecuted believers in Myanmar through literature distribution, discipleship programmes, livelihood support and various forms of training.

- For reconciliation between religious groups in Myanmar
- For the protection of the thousands of vulnerable people who are now displaced due to conflict
- Thank God for persecution survival training which has brought hope and encouragement to Christians.

Everybody must wear Islamic dress and observe Ramadan, or face being harassed and arrested. In some areas, violent Islamic extremists are a threat. Even foreign Christians working in tourism are closely watched – if they worship publicly or discuss their faith with a local, they can be deported or even imprisoned.

Open Doors raises prayer support for persecuted believers in the Maldives.

- For religious freedom to come to the Maldives
- For ways for believers to safely communicate and access Bible materials
- That Christians feeling isolated will know God's presence and love.

Christians in China are experiencing intensifying pressure, as the Communist Party seeks to limit all threats to its power.

Believers need to be creative in how they meet, when even online messages can be monitored. Christian leaders are particularly vulnerable to persecution. Meanwhile, converts from Islam or Tibetan Buddhism can face threats and abuse for their faith.

Open Doors supports believers in China with discipleship and persecution survival training, and by providing contextualised Christian literature to believers who have converted from Islam or Buddhism.

PLEASE PRAY

- That Christians will be given strength, wisdom and boldness as they navigate surveillance and restrictions
- That young people will be equipped to stand strong in their faith
- That the church in China will continue to see remarkable growth, despite intensifying persecution.

Mali has risen several places on the World Watch List this year, as an unstable government has empowered violent Islamic extremist groups. They abduct, kill and enslave people, as well as recruiting young boys. Even in safer areas, believers from Muslim backgrounds will face intense pressure from their families to give up their faith.

Open Doors works through local partners in Mali to provide persecution survival training, discipleship programmes and economic empowerment projects.

PLEASE PRAY

- That stability, law and order will return to Mali
- For Open Doors partners' work to help vulnerable Christians earn a living
- That new believers will find fellowship with other Christians and retain their hope and joy.

Iraqi Christians experience ongoing harassment and persecution. Last year, dozens of Christians were physically abused, abducted or driven away, with homes and businesses confiscated.

In the north, huge numbers of Christians fled from so-called Islamic State (IS). Many have yet to return as bombing goes on. Violence has decreased, but Christians are far from safe and believers who've converted from Islam risk being shunned by their communities, or persecuted under blasphemy laws.

Open Doors local partners strengthen the church in Iraq with training, trauma care, Bibles and Christian books, livelihood projects and microloans, help to rebuild homes and churches, and crisis relief.

PLEASE PRAY

- For peace and stability to come to Iraq so Christians can return home
- For an end to all violence in the country, so believers can worship safely
- For God's protection and courage for new believers from Muslim backgrounds.



SILVA'S STORY

18 IRAQ

There are areas of Iraq that are still influenced by the ideology of so-called Islamic State. As a Christian, raising your voice can be dangerous. But for Silva, working in radio is not just a job, but a calling from God.

“My work at the ‘Voice of Peace’ radio station is a chance to deliver a message,” she says. “And it is called the ‘Voice of Peace’ because the church calls for peace.”

The ‘Voice of Peace’ radio station

broadcasts from Qaraqosh in northern Iraq, and reaches up to 150,000 listeners all over Iraq and the Middle East. Silva was trained up as a reporter for the radio, thanks to the prayers and gifts of Open Doors supporters.

“I benefitted a lot from this course, because I had no previous education in the field of the media,” she says. “As a reporter for the church, I’d like people to hear about and see the church and the work inside of the church

and how wonderful it is. And the amount of love that exists inside the church.”

Silva is hopeful that ‘Voice of Peace’ Radio will strengthen believers across Iraq and the Middle East. “Each Christian has a message and each Christian has a calling. And the Christian gets to discover their calling through the church and through being in the church. I count on God. And I follow this calling and fulfil it by depending 100 per cent on God.”

Two policemen shut a church in Boudjima, Algeria. In recent years the government has closed at least 16 churches, while refusing to officially register any new churches. So Christians meet illegally in private homes – risking heavy fines or even a prison sentence.

Christians in Algeria encounter many obstacles to expressing their faith from family, the community, and the state.

Most believers are converts from Islam and they can face intense pressure in all areas of life to renounce their faith. Meanwhile, Christian activities are severely hindered by laws regulating non-Muslim worship, including the prohibition of anything that would 'shake the faith of a Muslim'. Several churches have been closed in the past year, whilst others have had to cease their activities.

Open Doors works with local partners and churches in North Africa to provide leadership training, discipleship, livelihood support, Bibles and pastoral care.

PLEASE PRAY

- That the Holy Spirit will help Algerian Christians to stand firm in their faith
- That each believer will have opportunities to gather with other Christians for fellowship and discipleship
- For the reopening of closed churches and a relaxing of laws that stifle religious freedom.

PERSECUTION SCORE +2

In Mauritania, it is illegal to leave Islam and follow another faith.

Converts face extreme pressure for bringing shame on their families; they are likely to be shunned or abused. They may be accused of apostasy in a religious court, with severe consequences, or prosecuted for 'undermining national security by insulting Islam and threatening Mauritania's sacred principles'. It is extremely risky for Christians to meet together - even foreign-born Christians worshipping publicly can be charged with trying to evangelise to Muslims.

Open Doors works with local partners and churches in North Africa to provide leadership training, discipleship, livelihood support, Bibles and pastoral care.

PLEASE PRAY

- That the government of Mauritania would be open to religious freedom
- That the families of new believers would have open hearts and minds
- For Open Doors partners and other Christians working to support secret believers who've lost everything for Jesus.

Converts are likely to be pressured by their families to return to Islam; most choose to hide their faith.

Open Doors strengthens persecuted Christians in Central Asia by providing Bibles and Christian literature, biblical and vocational training, socio-economic development projects, and children's, youth and women's ministries.

PLEASE PRAY

- For protection for secret believers, and that they will draw close to God
- That God will soften the hearts of those who have rejected a family member for their Christian faith
- For bold faith for church leaders who are being monitored or threatened.

Church leaders are especially susceptible to threats, harassment and death, whilst Christian children are often targeted for recruitment. Those who evangelise among indigenous communities, or leave their traditional belief to become a Christian, can also face strong opposition.

Open Doors strengthens the persecuted church in Colombia through Bible distribution, training, trauma care, development projects, emergency relief aid, and education and safe houses for children.

PLEASE PRAY

- For God's strength and power for pastors facing harassment by gangs
- For Open Doors partners as they work to equip the church
- That new believers from criminal or indigenous backgrounds will inspire others with their courageous faith.

The threat from Islamic extremist groups has spread to cities that were previously beyond their reach. Meanwhile, Christians from Muslim backgrounds face enormous pressure from families and communities to renounce their faith.

Open Doors works through local partners to strengthen Christians in Burkina Faso by providing persecution survival training, relief aid, and spiritual and trauma care.

PLEASE PRAY

- That God will heal and comfort all those traumatised by jihadist attacks
- For wisdom and provision for Open Doors local partners as they serve those facing persecution
- For the protection of believers and local partners.

CENTRAL AFRICAN REPUBLIC

Ongoing conflict in Central African Republic (CAR) has resulted in thousands of Christians losing their homes and livelihoods, with many living in camps for internally displaced people.

Most of the country is occupied by armed militia groups who are responsible for a range of human rights abuses. When Christian leaders have publicly denounced the violence, they've been threatened, and their churches ransacked and torched.

Those who convert from Islam can also face persecution from their family and local community.

Open Doors works through local partners to support believers in the CAR with persecution survival training, economic empowerment projects and trauma care.

PLEASE PRAY

- For peace and stability in the country
- For the protection of believers, particularly church leaders
- That Christians will be able to provide for their families and even reach out to their local communities.

Converts from a Buddhist or ethnic-Animist background face the most severe persecution, not only from the authorities, but also from families, friends and neighbours. They are sometimes forced to leave their villages. Yet their numbers are reported to be growing.

Open Doors works through local partners to strengthen persecuted believers in Vietnam by providing relief and practical aid, advocacy support, Christian resources, leadership and discipleship training, and socio-economic development projects.

PLEASE PRAY

- For protection over women in northern provinces who are vulnerable to trafficking
- That new believers will grow in faith and boldness
- That leadership and discipleship projects will strengthen the church.

TURKMENISTAN

PERSECUTION SCORE +1

There is no freedom of religion in Turkmenistan. Christianity is treated with suspicion.

The dictatorial government uses a huge network of police, secret services and local Muslim leaders to closely monitor all religious activities. Fines can be issued for holding illegal gatherings, possessing religious literature and even for downloading Christian songs. Christians from a Muslim background may be subjected to house arrest, forced marriage and beatings to try to force them to return to Islam.

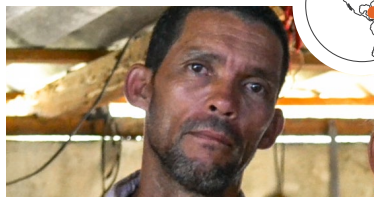

The authorities generally refuse to register new places of worship. Believers forced to meet in unregistered house churches can be heavily fined and have their church shut down.

Open Doors local partners strengthen the persecuted church in Cuba through Bible distribution, livelihood projects, biblical training, leadership development projects, care and support for children and pastors' families, and socio-economic development.

PLEASE PRAY

- That the regime would relax its surveillance
- For Open Doors partners encouraging churches that feel isolated from the world
- For wisdom and courage to Christians standing up for what's right.

NIGER

PERSECUTION SCORE +2

Most of Niger's population see being Muslim as part of Nigerien ethnicity, so converts face hostility. They may even be disowned by their families.

The increasing presence of violent Islamic extremist groups is a threat to the authorities and Christians in Niger. In some areas, believers meet in secret to avoid violent attacks. Christians face discrimination in the workplace, difficulty registering churches and are not treated equally by the law in family disputes.

Open Doors works through partners in Niger to strengthen persecuted Christians through economic empowerment programmes, leadership and discipleship training, persecution survival training and pastoral care for new believers.

PLEASE PRAY

- For protection against violence from extremist groups
- For economic empowerment groups in which women learn business skills
- Ask God to strengthen believers from Muslim backgrounds under pressure to deny their faith.

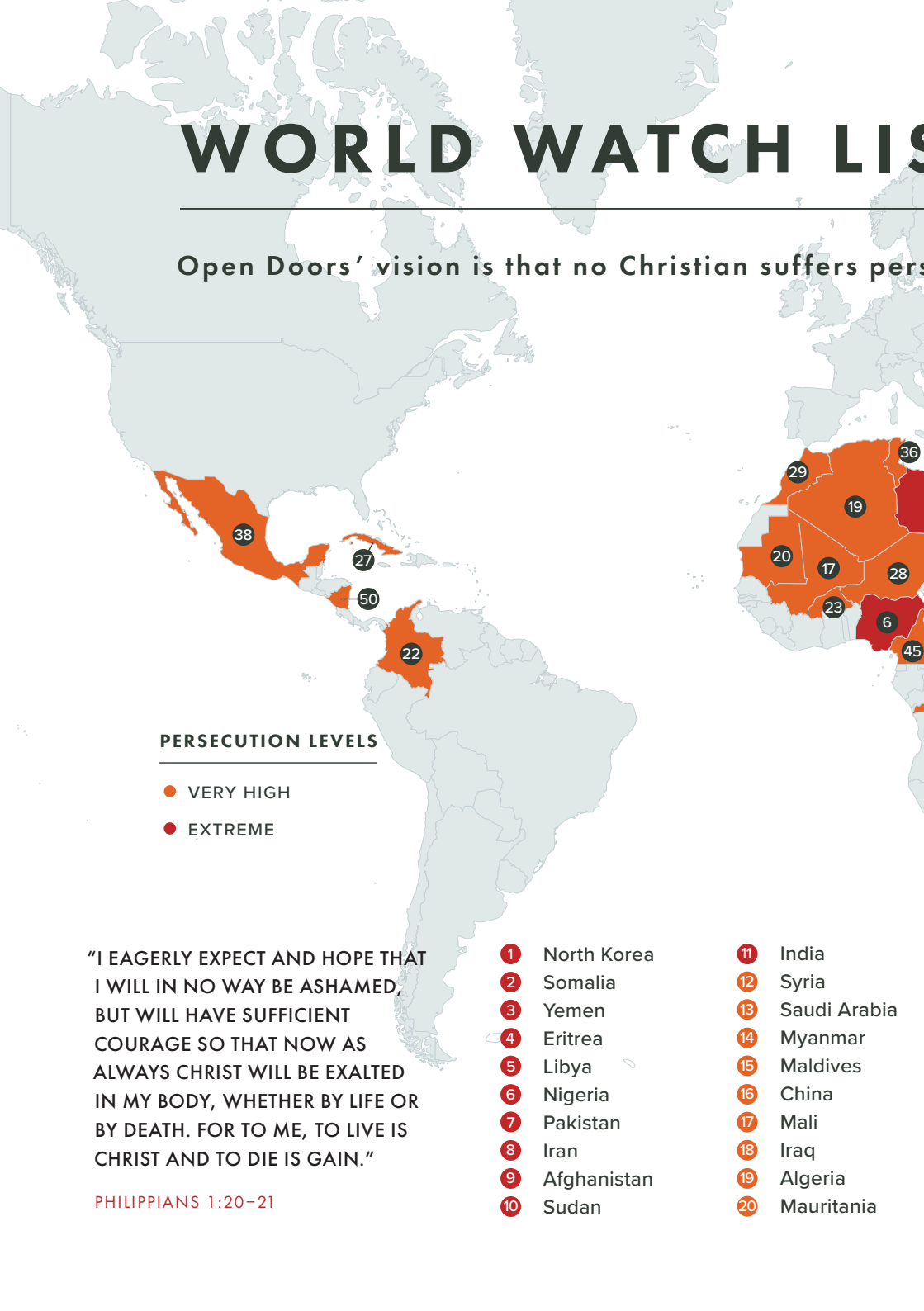

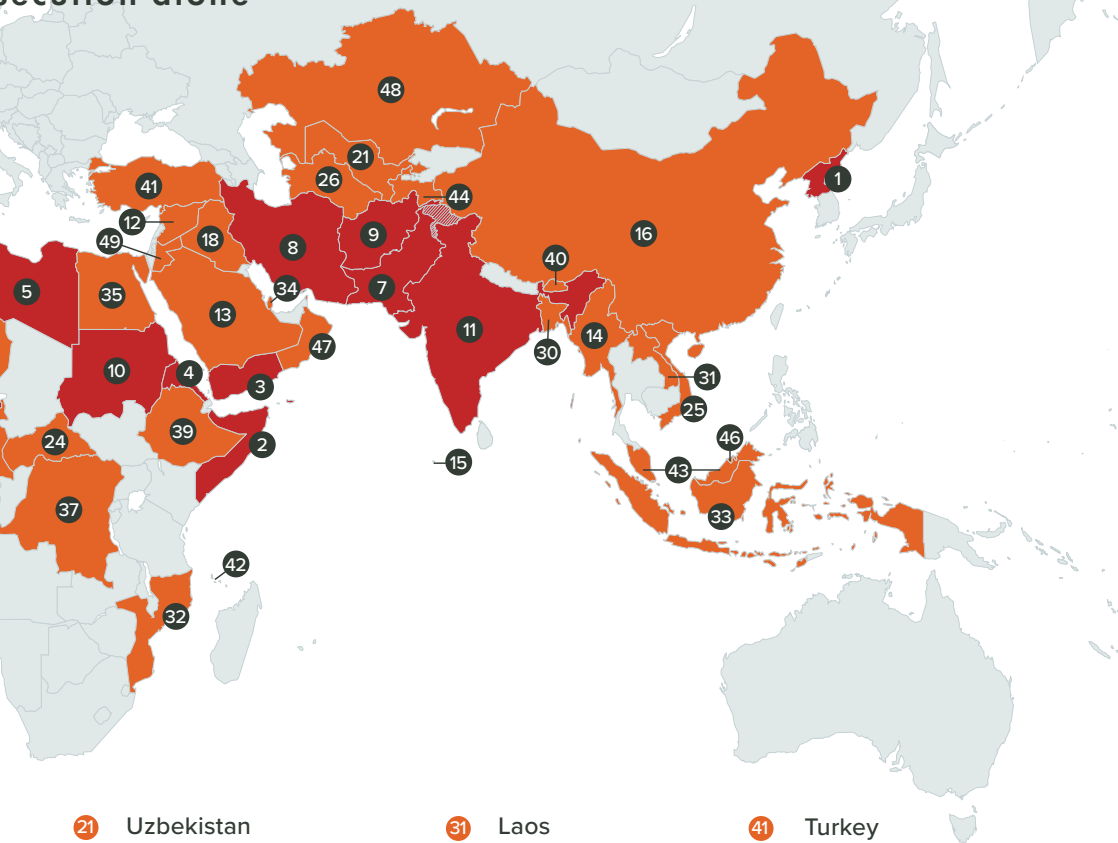

PERSECUTION SCORE no change

In Morocco, it's a criminal offence to 'shake the faith of a Muslim'.

Christians are sometimes beaten, interrogated, arrested or fined for nothing more than carrying a Bible, or discussing Christian faith with a Muslim. Violent Islamic extremist groups operate in the region. Converts from Islam face intense pressure to renounce their faith or lose everything, even custody of their children. Christians suffer harassment online as well. It's difficult to sustain any form of Christian fellowship.

Open Doors works with local partners and churches in North Africa to provide leadership training, discipleship, livelihood support, Bibles and pastoral care.

PLEASE PRAY

- For tolerance of all faiths in Morocco and for Christians to have the freedom to gather together
- For provision for those converts whose faith is known. Pray for jobs and support from family and friends
- For deepening of faith for Christians in Morocco, even when it is difficult to access resources.

In Bangladesh, the severest persecution is reserved for converts from Muslim, Hindu, Buddhist or tribal backgrounds.

Men can face false accusations and physical attack, whilst women are vulnerable to sexual, verbal and physical abuse. Meetings with other Christians are often done in secret. Churches that are engaged in outreach among Muslim communities can also face persecution. The arrest of church leaders can destabilise Christian communities and make them feel afraid to gather.

Open Doors works through local church partners to strengthen persecuted believers in Bangladesh through biblical training, Bible distribution, literacy and socio-economic development projects, and emergency relief aid.

PLEASE PRAY

- That Christians facing pressure for their faith will be strengthened
- That those who persecute Christians will encounter Jesus for themselves and give their lives to Him
- For healing for those traumatised by attacks.

PERSECUTION SCORE -1

The Communist authorities of Laos consider most church meetings ‘illegal gatherings’.

Registered churches are heavily monitored; any others have to operate secretly. Leaders of unregistered churches have been arrested and held for as long as a year, with huge sums charged for their release. Known Christians can easily lose their jobs. In October 2022, a pastor in central Laos was killed. People from the Buddhist-animist community who become Christians face pressure and can be expelled from their homes.

Open Doors partners strengthen persecuted believers in Laos by providing Christian materials, leadership and discipleship training, socio-economic development programmes, advocacy support and emergency relief.

PLEASE PRAY

- That Christians would be able to meet together without surveillance
- For an end to the unjust fines charged to release detained Christians
- That whole villages would come to know Christ through new believers.

PERSECUTION SCORE +3

Christians in northern Mozambique are increasingly in danger from militant Islamic extremist groups.

The groups have killed thousands of people, and Christians face daily threats of abduction or death. Hundreds of thousands have fled and now live in camps, traumatised by the violence. Converts from other religious backgrounds also often face heavy pressure from their families. Wives risk being divorced and losing everything including custody of their children.

Open Doors partners support persecuted Christians in Mozambique through emergency aid, persecution survival and cross-cultural awareness training, and economic empowerment projects.

PLEASE PRAY

- For peace in Mozambique, so Christians can worship without fear
- That Open Doors partners will reach more people in need with spiritual and economic support, and for protection for staff as they travel
- Thank God for the courage of those who are offering aid.

LORENA'S STORY

32 MOZAMBIQUE



Lorena* is originally from a fishing village in northern Mozambique. She is one of the thousands of Christians who have been displaced and widowed by the al-Shabaab insurgency in the north.

“We were hiding in the field, but they found us and surrounded us. They pointed guns at us but did not shoot. After that they took our husbands and began to decapitate them.”

Lorena took her family and fled. Open Doors local partners found them and supported them with practical aid, including food and clothing. Lorena will never return home to her village – but she doesn't know how long they will be safe from al-Shabaab militants.

Thankfully, she remains rooted in Christ. “In no one else I trust, only in God and Jesus Christ. Because He did not leave me...

He keeps me and my family, because of this we are still alive.

“My relationship with God is going well. I read the Bible; I always walk with it. When Sunday comes, I go to the church because the Bible is very important. I continue to pray to God, I pray that He gives me, my children and my sisters strength and life to continue moving forward.”

Indonesia has taken on a more conservative Islamic character in recent years, which can put pressure on Christians, especially converts.

These believers will likely experience intense pressure from their families to return to Islam. A church seen to be preaching the gospel runs into opposition from Islamic extremist groups, especially in rural areas. Thanks to effective anti-terror police, violence by Islamic extremists is uncommon, but many new Christians move to escape harassment.

Open Doors partners strengthen persecuted Christians in Indonesia by providing Bibles and Christian books, socio-economic empowerment projects, discipleship and persecution survival training and relief aid.

PLEASE PRAY

- For a more open and tolerant society towards Christians in Indonesia
- That God would comfort those rejected by their own families
- For the Open Doors team helping displaced Christians find new homes and jobs.

PERSECUTION SCORE -6

Converts from Islam to Christianity face the most severe persecution, including discrimination, harassment and police monitoring. Qatari believers are few in number and keep their faith secret.

Expat Christians form the largest group of Christians and are mostly migrant workers from Asia and Africa. They cannot openly practise their faith; telling a Muslim about Jesus can lead to prosecution and deportation. Many migrant workers have to live and work in poor conditions, while their Christian faith adds to their vulnerability.

Open Doors supports the body of Christ on the Arabian Peninsula by organising prayer, distributing Scripture resources, and training believers and pastors.

PLEASE PRAY

- For secret believers in the Arabian Peninsula, that God will strengthen their faith
- That the culture would shift to become more tolerant towards Christians in the Arabian Peninsula
- For protection for Christian migrant workers who face mistreatment at the hands of their employers.

Egypt is a country where Christians are supposedly allowed freedom of religion, but the authorities fail to protect them from local opposition and even violence.

Christian women report being harassed and beaten for not wearing Islamic dress. In rural areas, whole Christian communities have been driven out. Converts from Islam face enormous pressure from their families to return to Islam, and cannot be legally registered as Christians. Though violence has slightly decreased, at least five Christians were killed for their faith last year.

Open Doors works through local partners in Egypt to support the church with literacy training, education support, advocacy, medical outreach, and youth, family and women's ministries.

PLEASE PRAY

- That the authorities would act to protect Christians' rights
- For God's protection and strength for converts from Islam
- That the love and courage of Egyptian Christians would draw many people to Christ.

PERSECUTION SCORE +1

Tunisia is 99% Muslim and Tunisian Christians, almost all of whom are from a Muslim background, are discriminated against by family and society.

In some cases, Christians are abandoned by their families and rejected by their friends. Their jobs may also be at risk. Most Christian converts cannot worship openly and choose to hide their faith since it is dangerous to share their beliefs. If they're found to be part of a Christian gathering, they risk exposure and ostracism.

Open Doors works with local partners and churches in North Africa to provide leadership training, discipleship, livelihood support, Bibles and pastoral care.

PLEASE PRAY

- For protection for believers from Muslim backgrounds in Tunisia
- That God will continue to make Himself known to the people of Tunisia
- That Christians who are abandoned by their families will find the support they need.

PERSECUTION SCORE +2

Christians living in east Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) are in grave danger as violent rebel groups fight for control of the region.

Prominent among these is an Islamic extremist group called the Allied Democratic Forces, which is brutally targeting Christians. This includes attacks on church leaders and kidnapping women as 'trophies'. People who have become Christians from Muslim or indigenous backgrounds face pressure to still participate in traditional religious activities.

Open Doors works through local partners to support Christians in DRC through persecution survival training, economic empowerment projects and trauma care.

PLEASE PRAY

- For stability and justice to return to eastern DRC
- That God gives church leaders great wisdom and strength as they look after their members
- For more opportunities to help churches providing trauma counselling and emergency aid.

PERSECUTION SCORE +2

To Mexico's organised crime gangs, Christians are a threat and a target.

When Christians speak out or refuse to obey the local gang, their church is soon in the firing line. In a lawless environment, church leaders are extorted for money, threatened or assaulted, especially if they are involved in any sort of activism. Pastors and priests have been kidnapped, badly beaten or killed.

In rural areas, new believers from more traditional backgrounds also face persecution from their communities. Intolerance of Christians is increasing as Mexico becomes more secular.

Open Doors strengthens persecuted believers in Mexico with biblical training, legal support, trauma care and socio-economic aid.

PLEASE PRAY

- For a return of law and order to Mexico, where crime currently reigns
- For God's wisdom and power for Christians standing up to the criminal gangs in their areas
- For safety for those who travel a long way to access Bible training or discipleship.

ADOLFINA'S STORY

38 MEXICO

When Adolfina and her husband Imeldo became Christians, they knew that it would be dangerous to return to their hometown to tell people about Jesus – but their love for God and for their community compelled them to go.

At first, no one listened – but gradually, as they persisted, a small church of new believers began to form. But Christian worship is considered a betrayal by some indigenous

communities in Mexico – like San Andrés Yaá, Adolfina's hometown – who highly value their ancestral traditions. So as their church grew, opposition surfaced.

Adolfina remembers when the anger in the community against them came to a head. “They brought the people together, held an assembly and forbade us to hold services. But my husband said, ‘No, I will not give up my Christ. Do what you want – I won’t give up.’”

Pastor Imeldo was locked up and, that same night, the church building was destroyed. Imeldo and Adolfina eventually left San Andrés Yaá.

Sadly, Pastor Imeldo died from Covid in 2020, but Adolfina is being cared for by Open Doors partners. “I thank the brothers and sisters who support all the Christians who are suffering,” she says. “We are grateful. The only thing I ask is to continue praying for us.”

Christianity may be the majority religion in Ethiopia, but many face persecution.

Believers from Muslim backgrounds can be threatened with death and are often forced to flee their homes. In 2022, Islamic extremists attacked more than 20 churches.

Those from traditional Ethiopian Orthodox Church backgrounds can also be completely shunned if they move to a Protestant or non-traditional denomination. Christians in tribal areas are expected to take part in tribal conflict; refusal can trigger a violent backlash.

Open Doors works through the local church to strengthen Christians in Ethiopia with leadership and persecution survival training and economic empowerment projects.

PLEASE PRAY

- For justice for Christians being denied their basic rights
- That new Christians facing strong disapproval and persecution would know God's presence
- For Open Doors' work to disciple believers and strengthen the church.

BHUTAN



POPULATION

LEADER

King Jigme Khesar Namgyel Wangchuck

PERSECUTION SCORE -1

All Bhutanese citizens are expected to follow Buddhism, which means anyone who converts to Christianity is exposed to hostility from their family and community.

This can include job loss and disinheritance, and even false accusations of being bribed to convert. Bhutanese culture is very communal and the protection of family is crucial, so ostracism by loved ones can have an enormous impact. No churches have official state recognition, meaning that gatherings for worship are technically illegal.

Open Doors works through local partners to strengthen persecuted Christians in Bhutan through prayer support and other practical emergency help.

PLEASE PRAY

- That those who have suffered loss for their faith will have their needs met
- That Christians will have fresh revelations of Jesus that will help sustain them in the face of hostility
- That the Holy Spirit will refresh and revitalise believers who are feeling particularly discouraged.



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Izmir in Turkey is the biblical Smyrna – a city with a rich Christian heritage. This was a land visited by the apostles. And yet now religious nationalism is increasing and the country’s Christian past is being denied.

Religious nationalism is very strong in Turkey. Anyone who is not a Muslim is considered disloyal and unpatriotic.

Since religious affiliation is still recorded on ID cards, it is easy to discriminate against Christian job applicants. Although conversion from Islam to Christianity is not illegal, converts are put under pressure by their families and communities to return to Islam. If their faith is discovered, they may be threatened with divorce and the loss of inheritance rights.

Open Doors raises worldwide prayer support for persecuted believers in Turkey.

PLEASE PRAY

- That Christian converts will feel loved and accepted by God, even when their own families reject them
- For the Turkish government to make policies that recognise Christians as equal to Muslims
- For opportunities for Christians in Turkey to share Jesus safely, with friends and family.

In Comoros, choosing to leave Islam to follow Jesus is so risky that those who do so have little option but to keep their faith secret. It can lead to violence from extremist groups, or prosecution from the state.

It is illegal for followers of any religion except Islam to evangelise, so any Christian who shares their faith could face legal consequences. This will likely involve a fine and up to a year in prison.

Open Doors works through local partners to strength the persecuted church in East African islands through discipleship and economic empowerment projects.

PLEASE PRAY

- That all Christians forced to keep their faith secret will have access to fellowship and discipleship
- That those facing pressure and persecution for their faith will feel the Holy Spirit empowering them to stand strong
- That opportunities will emerge for Christians to boldly share their faith with others.

PERSECUTION SCORE +3

Malaysia's constitution expects every ethnic Malay to be Muslim. A convert to Christianity is likely to experience extreme pressure from their family to return to Islam.

If the authorities find out about their faith, they can be arrested, interrogated about their Christian network - and potentially imprisoned or sentenced to death. All minority religious groups and NGOs, including established churches, are monitored by the authorities. With elections due this year, Malaysia is becoming more conservatively Islamic.

Open Doors works with local church partners in Malaysia to provide discipleship training, Bibles and Christian books and socio-economic assistance.

PLEASE PRAY

- That the legal situation for Malaysian Christians will improve after the elections
- That the authorities will stop disrupting Christian gatherings
- That Malaysian Christians will know God's love for them and reflect it strongly to others.

Tajikistan's totalitarian leadership treats any perceived 'deviation' from cultural norms with suspicion.

Most Christians are Russian Orthodox, and those from other denominations face significant persecution. Church services are often disrupted, and believers can be arrested for holding private prayer meetings or possessing 'illegal' religious material. Indigenous Christians from a Muslim background face huge pressure to return to Islam, as it is believed that a true Tajik can only be Muslim.

Open Doors strengthens persecuted Christians in Central Asia by providing Bibles and Christian literature, biblical and vocational training, development projects, and children's, youth and women's ministries.

PLEASE PRAY

- For the government to recognise the right to freedom of religion
- That church leaders who are under pressure will be equipped to lead
- That believers from Muslim backgrounds will find ways to meet to encourage one another.

BALDINA'S STORY

45 CAMEROON

Baldina had been a nominal Christian all her life – until the day her son was killed by Boko Haram militants. He was only 25 years old. “His name was Kamadi Cheguede,” she says. “Boko Haram attacked our village while we were at home. My son jumped the wall to escape. But they were waiting there and killed him.”

Her other son survived the attack, but ran for his life for fear of the same fate. “He fled to the city without telling me. We are very worried, we are unable to eat, our hearts are not peaceful.”

Attacks like this are becoming more and more common, especially in the far north of Cameroon where Baldina and her



husband live. Islamic extremist attacks are spreading across West Africa – but they cannot extinguish the healing hope of the gospel.

In the midst of her grief and anxiety, Baldina turned to the church. “I went to church because of my

wounded heart after I lost my son. My heart was in turmoil. Then I told myself that there, in the church, I will find peace. When I hear the message and listen to the songs, I am comforted. I thank God for everything. He is helping me to be strong today.”

The Anglophone crisis – a civil war that's been fought since 2017 – has made church leaders who speak out against violence a target for separatist groups and the government. The country lacks good governance, adding to the vulnerability of many believers.

Open Doors works through local partners to strengthen persecuted Christians in Cameroon by providing emergency relief aid, trauma care, economic empowerment projects and spiritual care for new believers.

PLEASE PRAY

- That the government and security forces will be stirred to address the country's growing insecurity
- That the Holy Spirit will comfort those traumatised by attacks
- That Open Doors local partners will be strengthened as they serve those affected by persecution.

PERSECUTION SCORE +1

The growing implementation of Sharia (Islamic law) in Brunei is making life increasingly challenging for the country's tiny Christian minority. It has the goal of making the country fully Muslim, and conversion from Islam is illegal.

Protestant Christian groups can only register as secular organisations and are required to submit annual financial and operational reports to the government. All church activities are monitored and church leaders are warned against doing outreach or becoming too public. Pressure against Christians is steadily increasing.

Open Doors raises prayer support for persecuted believers in Brunei.

PLEASE PRAY

- That young Christians who are under pressure from peers will have the strength to hold onto their faith
- That church leaders will be given wisdom as they disciple believers whilst navigating restrictions
- That the authorities will have a change of heart and give greater freedom to those who choose not to follow Islam.

Open Doors supports the body of Christ on the Arabian Peninsula by organising prayer, distributing Scripture resources, and training believers and pastors.

PLEASE PRAY

- That Omani society becomes more accepting of Christianity
- For Open Doors partners working in the Arabian Peninsula to be equipped to serve persecuted believers
- That God would continue to reveal Himself to locals through dreams.

PERSECUTION SCORE +1

Religious freedom is restricted, and government surveillance and control continue to increase.

The Russian Orthodox Church is generally tolerated by the state with some restrictions. But believers from Muslim backgrounds can be fined, detained and imprisoned if they're caught meeting up. They also face persecution and rejection from their family and community.

It is difficult for Kazakh Christians to earn a living; they may lose their job or be asked to pay a bribe to run their business.

Open Doors strengthens persecuted Christians in Central Asia by providing Bibles and Christian literature, biblical and vocational training, development projects, and children's, youth and women's ministries.

Jordan is tolerant of religious diversity - as long as everybody stays in their religion of birth.

Orthodox and Roman Catholic churches are recognised and tolerated. However, non-traditional churches face persecution, as do believers who've converted from Islam and those who are active in sharing the gospel with Muslims.

New Christians have been subject to days of interrogation and beatings, while being pressured to inform on other Christians. Even those seen to be helping Muslim background believers can be intimidated and threatened.

Open Doors works with local partners in Jordan to support Christians through training, relief aid and rehabilitation projects and raising prayer support.

The hostility facing Christians in Nicaragua has worsened, pushing the country into the top 50 of the World Watch List.

Since protests broke out against his dictatorial rule in 2018, President Daniel Ortega and his wife, Vice President Rosario Murillo, have forcefully sought to silence dissenting voices, especially the church given its influence in the country.

Christian schools and TV stations have been closed, as have faith-based charities, while believers have been arbitrarily detained and prosecuted.

Open Doors strengthens the persecuted church in Nicaragua by providing Christian literature, discipleship training, emergency aid, and education for pastors who have not completed their studies.

- That opposition won't deter Christians from sharing their faith

BLESSED ARE THE RISK-TAKERS



BROTHER ANDREW

It all began with a risk. In 1955, Andrew Van der Bijl, a young Dutchman at a theological college in Glasgow, discovered that there was a huge Socialist congress taking place in Poland. He decided to go. So armed only with courage, faith and a suitcase full of gospel tracts, he boarded a train for Warsaw. And, as it turned out, into a whole new life.

In Communist Europe, behind the Iron Curtain, Andrew discovered a persecuted, oppressed church struggling to survive. But more than that, he discovered

his life-long calling to 'strengthen what remains and is about to die' (Revelation 3:2). He began smuggling Bibles into all the countries of Communist Europe. And then, joined by others, he started seeking out and supporting persecuted Christians in China, Vietnam, Africa, Latin America, the Middle East, the world... He became known as Brother Andrew, while his Bible-smuggling exploits gave him the nickname, 'God's Smuggler'.

Today, Open Doors - the organisation which grew from his travels

- is active in more than 70 countries around the world, serving and supporting millions of Christians who face persecution and oppression.

He once visited a Native American Apache group in the USA. They gave him an Apache name which means 'He who crosses the lines'. That was his life. It is also the calling of Open Doors. And, indeed, every Christian.

"If we truly want to spread the good news of Christ," Brother Andrew wrote, "we must penetrate into all the world - our neighbourhoods, offices, schools, as well as regions across the globe. Not just where we are welcome or where the risk is minimal, but everywhere."

Brother Andrew died, aged 94, in September 2022.

He fought the fight. He kept the faith. He ran the race.

He crossed the line.
